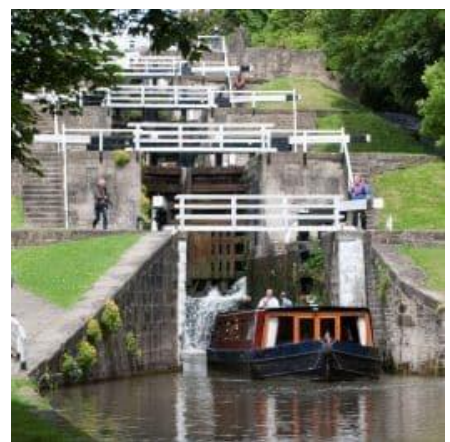

	What will I learn? National Curriculum – Geography Aims Pupils should develop an understanding of the similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the UK. Use some basic geographical vocabulary such as ocean, river, soil, vegetation, season, city, town, village, factory, farm, port and canal. National Curriculum links to other subjects - Art – Through the study of canal art - History – Pupils learn about events beyond living memory, such as the industrial revolution School Values – Ambition, Resilience, Responsibility

Canal	A canal is a human-made waterway that allows boats and ships to transport goods (inland) from place to place. They also allow boats and ships to pass from one body of water to another.		Basic geographical vocabulary to refer to key physical and human features	
Barge Canal boat	A long and narrow boat used on a canal. A barge can be used to for leisure or to transport goods.		Use world maps, atlases and globes

Natural feature	Natural features are part of the land, and many were in a place before people lived there		Our local canal is the Leeds Liverpool Canal	
Habitat	A habitat is a home for plants and animals or other living things.		Know that a canal is a human-made waterway and understand that they were invented to transport goods on a barge	
Lock	A canal lock lifts or lowers canal boats and barges from one water level to another.		Know where the Leeds Liverpool Canal goes and understand the canal connects towns and cities	
Landmark	Landmarks are features or structures around the world that are easily recognised or unique. They can be natural or human-made.		Know the points of a compass (North, East, South and West) and use these to describe position or give directions	
Map Key	A map key is a little box of information found at the bottom of a map. It contains an explanation of what the different lines and symbols on the map mean		Know that a map has a key, and use this to identify features	
Inland	If something is situated inland, it is away from the coast; towards or near the middle of a country.		Know the key features along a canal	
Symbol	A symbol is a drawing, shape, or object that represents something else.		Talk about how to keep safe around water (wider curriculum)
